#### EDITORIAL NOTE

Extracts from a catalogue of Derbyshire Maps compiled by Mr. Charles Handford will appear in this and forthcoming issues of the Miscellany in such a form that they may be detached and assembled into a separate volume. For the benefit of those readers who do not have W. Douglas White's short account of Derbyshire Mapmakers (Derbyshire Miscellany Volume 1, No.1 1956) this has been reprinted.

Charles C. Handford, who was born in 1890, has done much to foster the study of local history in the county. He is by profession a teacher, and was headmaster of Mary Swanwick Secondary School at Old Whittington from 1920 until his retirement in 1950. He is a founder member and the President of the Chesterfield branch of the Historical Association and of the Chesterfield Philatelic Society, both of which have been in existence for more than 21 years. He is also a lifelong member of the Derbyshire Archaeological Society and serves on its Council. Mr. Handford who was for many years a co-opted member of the Chesterfield Library and Museum Committee, is probably Chesterfield's best known historian. He has long taken a special interest in the history of Whittington and the Revolution House, and in the work of Dr. Samuel Pegge, his great predecessor in the field. In 1967 he crowned his work for Chesterfield by presenting his collection of original manuscripts and holograph copies, books, illustrations and other papers of Pegge, the history of Whittington and the Revolution House to the Borough of Chesterfield. This collection is now housed in the Revolution House, Old Whittington, where it is available to students of local history.

Amongst the many projects which have occupied Mr. Handford's energies has been the compilation of a detailed list of some of the atlases of Great Britain and Ireland containing maps of Derbyshire.

The list itself is seventy four pages long and contains notes arranged in tabular form on the editions and reprintings of the major atlas. For the purpose of this article the material has been rearranged in narrative form each section headed by the name of the cartographer originally responsible.

Mr. Handford does not claim that his list is complete but it fulfills a much needed want as nothing of the kind is at present available for Derbyshire.

The work is based primarily on Thomas Chubb "The Printed Maps in the Atlases of Great Britain and Ireland 1579-1870" published in 1927. But it must be remembered that not all County maps were issued in atlases, for example the large-scale maps of the County by Burdett, Greenwood and Sanderson. Nor does Chubb include other classes of maps such as the appropriate sheets of the early editions of the Ordnance Survey and early Geological maps. Mr. H. Nichols, who is at present engaged on a survey of Derbyshire maps, has drawn attention to a new work by Mr. R.A. Skelton - a revision of Chubb which is in process of publication in parts.

#### NOTES ON DERBYSHIRE COUNTY MAPS 1579-1800

To study local history we need the modern Ordnance Survey maps, but we must constantly go back to the early county maps for an intimate peep into our past history.

An important factor in Tudor Policy was emphasis on local contacts but, prior to the reign of Elizabeth, a necessary tool for implementing this policy was lacking, viz. a reliable map of England. On her accession, Elizabeth gave instructions to William Cecil, Secretary of Council, to obtain a detailed map of England and Ireland and "to study and digest it".

Since the year 1548 the Royal Printer has been preparing County Charts to illustrate Holinshed's "Chronicles" but this work was issued in 1577 without the maps as they were found to be incomplete. In the meantime, Thos. Seckford, one of the Queen's Masters of Requests commissioned a young man in his employ, one Christopher Saxton to survey and draw maps of all the counties in England and Wales.

Little is known of Saxton's life. Born in Yorkshire about year 1542, he undertook this immense task and in 1579 published his Atlas of County Maps of England and Wales - a work which formed the basis of all English Atlases for the next 100 years. Saxton was granted a 10 years' monopoly by the What of Saxton's tools for the job? - triangulation of a crude Queen. sort, the astrolabe, compass and cross-staff and the inclination to "ascend the highest tower in the town and thence view all around". The standard of measurement is the Old English Mile of 2428 yards. No meridians or parallels are given, but Saxton followed Mercator who drew his prime meridian through St. Michael in the Azores. Saxton's Derbyshire County Map published 1577 owes much in style to the great Dutch cartographer, Ortelius, but the engraving has a lighter touch and is less florid, also contemporary colouring is more restrained. No roads are shown, but river crossings are marked. The conventional signs for churches etc. bear a strong resemblance to our Ordnance Survey. Hills appear as shaded humps. Positions of towns and villages are only approximate. Parks are fully indicated, no doubt as an inducement to subscribers. Saxton's Derbyshire map was not only included in the Atlas, but was published as a separate sheet (the actual plate was used as late as 1720). It was also re-engraved a number of times on a smaller scale and of poorer quality and was used in editions of Camden's Brittania.

John Speed, born in Cheshire in 1552, published the second English Atlas in 1611. The Derbyshire map is finely engraved by the Dutchman Hondius and dated 1610. A plan of Derby and a curious view of Buxton are included. This map is not based on any actual survey but is largely borrowed from Saxton. Many editions were taken off the original copper plate and the date was crudely altered in 1660. In the later copies the plate is worn and cracked. In the writer's opinion, Speed has been given too high a place among our native cartographers. Although many more Derbyshire County maps were published before the last quarter of the 17th century, few added anything to knowledge of the County. It was during this period that the splendid pictorial county maps by Blaeu and Janszon were imported from the map factories of Antwerp. The Derbyshire sheet by Blaeu is a fine example of the printer's craft and is brilliantly coloured, but again, there is no evidence of a survey, and one suspects that the map maker's chief interest was decoration.

In 1675 John Ogilby, published his Book of Roads and established himself as one of the most practical of English geographers. He surveyed the 100 main roads of England and Wales, using a compass for direction and a "perambulator" to measure the distances. The latter instrument was trundled behind a coach, and consisted of a road wheel with a device for counting the revolutions of the wheel. Ogilby was the first to apply the measured mile of 1760 yards. His road charts were engraved in strip form, and look very like the A.A. routes of the present day. Ogilby gives the Derby to Buxton route through Kedleston, (old house and Church at side of road), Hulland-open road over common, Monyash, and then by what appears little more than a track to Buxton. Here is original work, with every mile numbered and total distances expressed in miles and furlongs.

Robert Morden's Derbyshire maps were published in large numbers and varying sizes towards the end of the 17th Century. They are still easy to obtain and cheap. His maps show 3 scales of rules of varying length, an example of the confusion in measurement existing at this date. A few roads are included and meridians and parallels are indicated, also minutes of time from London.

During the 18th century there was a great demand for Atlases. Consequently Derbyshire maps of this period are in great variety, but much of the information remains vague and roads are still reluctantly included. A popular map was Emanuel Bowen's sheet of 1777. The map itself is surrounded by descriptions of the "Seven Wonders of the Peak". Some idea of his style can be gained by quoting from the map his estimate of the height of North Derbyshire hills. He says "the top of the mountains seem to be as high above the clouds, as the clouds are above the common hills"! Bowen's romantic style marked the end of an era and John Cary of London in 1787 published his first Atlas of English County Maps. Though small in size (4 to) this work set a standard which is an inspiration to this day.

Cary's Derbyshire County Maps are typical of his production. His 1787 sheet gives the complete road system with mail coach road marked out, and the beginning of our Canal System, with the "New Cut" later called "Trent and Mersey" Canal. Hill contcurs are hatched in for the first time. All the information is given with an accuracy never before attempted. Yet there is no feeling of crcwding, due largely to the high quality of the engraving. Cary continued to publish well into the 19th century.

In 1784 General Roy measured out his first base-line (5 miles) on Hounslow Heath for the Trigonometrical Survey and in 1792 the main Ordnance Survey began: the new base-line differed only  $2\frac{3}{4}$ " from that of General Roy.

#### Introduction

Richard Gough was the first writer to deal with maps as a subject for study, tracing their history from the crudities of the Ancient World to the reign of Elizabeth I. when real interest in surveys of our island began. Gough's first publication was "Anecdotes of British Topography" in 1768 and in this he attempted to record map production in Britain from Saxton to the latter half of the eighteenth century. The second edition entitled 'British Topography' appeared in 1780 and brought the records up to date.

It is surprising that a field so rich in material should be so long neglected, for not until the turn of the present century was the subject scientifically studied. The appearance of "The Maps of Hertfordshire" by Sir H.G. Fordham in 1907 marked the turning point which focussed the attention of students on the importance of County Maps in the pursuit of information on local affairs. In 1911 Thomas Chubb, whose vast experience, gained during a period of over forty years' work in the Map Room of the British Museum, had given unrivalled opportunities for studying maps of every description, produced catalogues of the Maps of Wiltshire, followed by those of Gloucester and Somerset. These have been succeeded by volumes on many other counties, Derbyshire being a notable exception.

A short list of fourteen maps of Derbyshire drawn up by J.S. Luxmore, first appeared in "Notts. & Derby Notes & Queries" May 1893 under the title "Derbyshire Bibliography", but no further attempt was noted until "Notes on Derbyshire County Maps" by W.D. White was published in "Derbyshire Miscellany" in February 1956.

Engravers of the great Dutch and Flemish school were mainly responsible for the numerous maps of the English Counties during the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries, the work of both drawing and engraving being executed in the Netherlands. Apart from some of the work of Hollar, that of other artists of foreign extraction employed in this country shows less artistic merit.

A great improvement took place in the middle of the eighteenth century mainly due to the superior skill and ability shown by Thos. Kitchin, the Bowens and some of their contemporaries. The dominating figure during the first half of the nineteenth century was John Cary who has been termed by one great admirer "The Founder of the Modern English School." He flourished during a period of great activity in land surveying and map production in which he played a major roll. He combined beauty and design with a nearer approach to geographic accuracy than even the Bowen and Kitchin Circle had attained and he maintained throughout a high standard of excellence as author, engraver, and publisher. Cary's "New Map of England and Wales with part of Scotland" issued in 1794 was the first map drawn with the prime meridian at Greenwich, adopted in the 1925 conference for the international map of the world.

A small collection of Derbyshire Maps made during the past forty years by the present writer, had been listed and mounted, when, in 1951 considerable additions were made to the Borough collection in the Chesterfield Central Library by Mr. G.R. Micklewright. These were studied and added to the catalogue. The appearance of Mr. White's "Notes on Derbyshire County Maps" provided the spur to greater activity in producing as complete a catalogue as research and ability allowed.

Wherever possible descriptions of the Atlases and other publications containing the County Maps have been given - mainly in abridged form - to enable the maps separated from their context to be correctly identified. Repetition of titles in the case of further editions and reprints has been avoided, but all alterations in imprint and other essential points are recorded for the purpose of enabling the student to determine with accuracy the date of production of the map he has acquired. It will be observed that County Maps from the same Atlas frequently carry different dates of engraving, the Atlas itself being published at a still later date. Wherever this occurs both dates have been recorded.

Students and collectors will be familiar with the position of the prime meridian fixed by Mercator as, "The line passing through or near the island of Ferro," defined as  $20^{\circ}$  W. of Paris, used by our early cartographers, but it appears to be less widely known that John Seller, Hydrographer to Charles II, James II and Queen Anne, was the first of our map makers to place it through London, c.1676. (This distinction is also attributed to John Adams whose "ANGLIAE TOTIUS TABULA ... etc." appeared in 1698).

In the compilation of this catalogue numerous works and well known authorities have been consulted, particular indebtedness being gratefully acknowledged to Sir H.G. Fordham's "Maps of Hertfordshire" and "John Cary, Engraver;" to Thomas Chubb's "The Printed Maps and Atlases of Great Britain and Ireland," and to the Borough Librarian and his staff at the Chesterfield Central Library for their untiring efforts in giving every assistance for research and for their unfailing courtesy which made work among them a pleasure.

# SELECTIONS FROM A LIST OF DERBYSHIRE MAPS

# 1577 CHRISTOPHER SAXTON

Saxton produced the first maps of the English and Welsh Counties between 1574 and 1579, when his complete atlas was published. The maps bear different dates. The Derbyshire Map is inscribed, "UNIVERSI DERBIENSIS COMITATUS GRAPHICA DESCRIPTIO 1577. C. SAXTON DESCRIPSIT, SCALA MILLARIUM 10(= 4 inches).

- 1. This first impression is engraved on paper with a watermark of crossed arrows. The size of the map is 19½ x 15¼ inches. Five further imprints are of the same size but distinguishable by their different water marks.
- 2. Watermark a bunch of grapes with letter "A" on left and "F" on right of stem.
- 3. Watermark a bunch of grapes surmounted by fleur de lys.
- 4. Watermark a bunch of grapes with ornamental appendage letter "B" on left and "C" on right, with arrows.
- 5. Watermark as 3, but the map is mounted. This map appears to have been specially produced for sale in the County separate from the Atlas.
- 6. Watermark a kneeling Saint holding a cross.

Saxton's maps were engraved on copper plate. When used, water colour was applied by hand. 8 towns are named and indicated by red towers. Hills are shown as mounds, parks are shown as ringed enclosures and woods indicated by clumps of trees. Rivers are drawn in but no roads are shown.

The map was re-issued in another edition "The Maps of all the Shires in England and Wales. Exactly taken and truly described by Christopher Saxton. And graven at the charges of a private gentleman for the publicke good. Now newly revised, amended and re-printed. Printed for William Web at the Globe in Cornehill, 1645." The Derbyshire map, which is the same size as before is described as "An Exact Map of Darbieshire Anno 1642 ... with Arms of Charles I".

An edition of smaller scale measuring  $8\frac{1}{4} \ge 12\frac{1}{2}$  inches was reduced by William Hole from Saxton's map of 1577 for the 6th edition of Camden's Britannia, published in 1607. This was the last edition produced during Camden's lifetime and the first to contain a series of County maps. The text is in Latin. The title for the Derbyshire map is "Universi Derbiensis Comitatus qui olim Corit an orum fuit descriptio. Christo. Saxton descrip. Guliel Hole sculpsit, Scala miliarium 8 (=  $2\frac{1}{8}$  inches)" - 4 -

Hole not only reduced Saxton's map but redesigned the decorative titles, Scales of miles and other ornaments. The map is numbered 28.

This edition was re-issued in 1610 for the first edition of Camden's Britannia in English translated by Philemon Holland. Scale 8 (=  $2\frac{1}{8}$  inches) as before. Re-issued in 1637. The maps in all three editions of Camden, 1607, 1610 and 1637 are from the same plate.

Saxton's maps were again redrawn in 1690 on the smaller scale  $8 (= 2\frac{1}{8} \text{ inches})$  by Philip Lea in "The Shires of England and Wales" described by Christopher Saxton, being the best and original maps. With many Additions and Corrections viz. ye Hundds Roads, etc. by Philip Lea. Also the New Surveys of Ogilby, Seller etc. Sold by Philip Lea at the Atlas and Hercules in Cheapside near Friday Street and at his shop in Westminster Hall near the Court of Common Pleas where you may have all sorts of Globes, Mapps etc. (1690) Fol'.

In this edition the insert plans of the town are copied from those of John Speed's maps of the Counties of England together with the Arms of Noble men associated with the individual counties.

On the Derbyshire map, No.8 in this edition copies of the arms of John of Gaunt and Thomas Standley (correctly named on the Speed map) have had the identifying name plates transposed by Lea. He has replaced the arms of Thomas Seckford by the plan of "Darbie". The hundreds and main roads are added and the initials "C.R." above the Royal Arms.

#### 1599 PIETER van den Keere (PETER KEER)

Keer, a bookseller, was the brother-in-law of Hondius the Dutch cartographer. He produced fine miniature county maps  $4\frac{3}{44} \times 3\frac{3}{8}$  inches, copied from Saxton. The plates of all the Counties were first issued in 1599 but as yet no complete atlas or even a title page has been discovered. The map of Derbyshire is numbered 13 in this early issue. The scale 10 (= 15/16th")

This map was re-issued from the 1599 plate size  $3\frac{1}{2} \times 5\frac{5}{8}$  inches for the 1617 edition of Camden's Britannia. In 1620 the 1617 maps were reprinted for a further edition of Britannia "abridged from a far larger volume, done by John Speed anno cum privilegio (1620)".. and are to bee sould by Georg Humble at ye Whit horse in popeshead Alley". The map of 1620 was reprinted for another edition of Camden. The date 1627 is engraved on the title page only. Size the same scale 10 (=  $\frac{7}{8}$  inch). Other editions and reprints were produced in 1630 and 1646. The 1630 map is from a re-issue of the 1627 edition. The type has been re-set and is longer. The 1646 re-issue is precisely the same, the Derbyshire map is coloured.

In 1662 the imprint is corrected to "and are to be sold by Roger Rea the elder and younger at ye Golden Cross in Cornhill against ye exchange." This edition is referred to by Fordham in the supplement to his "Herefordshire Maps" 1666. Another edition but the date altered to 1666. The maps are the same as the 1620 issue in every respect. Another edition of Keer has date on title page altered to 1676. The maps are the 1620 issue  $3\frac{1}{2}$ in. by  $5\frac{5}{8}$ in. scale 10 miles (=  $\frac{3}{7}$ in.). A second title page to this edition of the Atlas reads "An Epitome of Mr. John Speed's Theatre of the Empire of Great Britain. And his Prospect of the Most Famous Parts of the World...London, Printed for Tho. Basset at the George in Fleet Street and Ric. Chiswell at the Rose and Crown in St. Paul's Church Yard 1676. (Keer's miniature English County Maps after Saxton seem often to have been wrongly attributed to Speed. See King Penguin Book No.61 pub. 1951 for reproductions of the 1627 maps. Darbyshire Map 9).

1595 <u>GERHARD MERCATOR</u> (1512-1594) real name Kremer and Gerhard Mercator Younger fl. 1595. Map entitled Eboraceum, Lincolnia, Derbia, Staffordia, Notinghamia, Lecestria, Rutlandia et Norfolcia. 10 miles (= 15/16in.) 16<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>in. x 12in. pub. 1595 and reprinted many times for about 50 years.(H.N.)

#### 1610 JOHN SPEED 1552-1629

A map of Derbyshire by John Speed in his "Theatre of Great Britaine". This work was published in 1611, but as in the case of some other counties, the maps were issued before that date and sold separately. The map of Derbyshire, divided into Hundreds, is dated 1610. Scale  $10 = (3\frac{3}{4} \text{ inches})$ , "Darbieshire Described" Map No.34 20 in. x 15 in.

John Speed, a worthy successor to Saxton, was an industrious and painstaking cartographer, who not only introduced new material into his maps but included a considerable amount of Heraldry into the framework, employing Dutch craftsmen - the best engravers of his day to execute the work. The maps were issued uncoloured, although some of the contemporary owners had their copies coloured. These early (1610) maps have plain backs, only the copies from the Atlas have printed text on the reverse. The early issues of Speed's maps bear the imprint of the publishers, John Sudbury and G. Humble.

"Map No.13...Darbieshire.....1610", "A collection of Maps of the Counties of England and Wales. By John Speed". (A series of early impressions of Speed's maps of the English counties. In some cases the maps were printed before the imprint, the engraver's name and the dates were added. Plain backs, except Kent.

Another edition - Title page corrected to 1614. (London printed by Thomas Snodham for John Sudburie and George Humble 1616). Map of Derbyshire No.13.

Latin Edition. "Theatrum Imperii Magnae Britanniae" etc. The Latin Edition of Speed's Atlas of Great Britain and Ireland is extremely scarce; the British Museum only secured a copy in 1918. The date on the title page is corrected to 1616. The maps are precisely the same as the 1614 issue

"Darbieshire" in another edition of "The Theatre of the Empire of Great Britaine" by John Speed 1627(-31) Are to be sold by George Humble at the White Horse in Popes Head Alley. The text on the back of the maps is re-set throughout. 10 miles (=  $3\frac{3}{4}$ in.)

"Darbieshire" in Another Edition of "The Theatre of the Empire of Great Britaine by John Speed. Imprinted at London, 1650. Are to be sold by Roger Rea the Elder, and younger, at the Golden Crosse in Cornhill agat. ye Exchange 1650-62 fol. The text throughout is reset in smaller type. The maps in Part 1 (England) are the same as the 1627 edition, with - in the case of Darbieshire - the following corrections: the imprint of Roger Rea (as given in the title) is substituted for that of J. Sudbury & G. Humble.


"Dabieshire" in England, Wales, Scotland and Ireland described and abridged from a far larger volume, with 62 of the 63 maps - Yorkshire missing -" bound with "A Prospect of the most famous parts of the world, with 20 maps". Sm. oblong. 8vo. old calf. Frinted by M.S. for Roger Rea 1665.

Another Edition of "The Theatre", date on the Map of Derbyshire is altered from 1610 to 1666, in, Vol.1 fol. London, Printed for Thomas Bassett and Richard Chiswell 1676. This is the same map of Derbyshire as 1610 - the only difference being in the altered date and imprint.

Another edition, 1676, Published by Thomas Bassett and Richard Chiswell. The sixty five maps of Great Britain and Ireland are coloured copies of the last mentioned issue. They have plain backs and were probably printed for separate publication as soon as Bassett and Chiswell had acquired the plates, and before the issue of the 1676 Atlas above.

Another Edition - "A Collection of the County Mapps of the Kingdome of England and Principality of Wales by John Seller (London 1680) fol." A miscellaneous collection of 57 maps of Gt. Br. and Ireland, including 39 (Derbyshire being one) from John Speed's Atlas of England and Wales. The Maps are without text. The map of Derbyshire bears the imprint of Thomas Bassett and Richard Chiswell and is a reprint from their edition of Speed's Atlas.

Another edition of Speed's Maps, "A Catalogue of a Set of Maps of the several Counties of England and Wales....each Map is printed on a sheet of good Royal paper....Printed and Sold by Henry Overton..... Sold either in sets or singly. (1710) The Map of Derbyshire bears the imprint of Bassett and Chiswell. This is probably the first issue of Speed's maps by Henry Overton.



#### DERBY IN 1610

This is an enlargement of the plan from the bottom left hand corner of John Speed's Map of Darbieshire described 1610. Performed by John Speede and to be sold in popeshead Alley by John Sudbury and G. Humble.

In the bottom right hand corner of the Derbyshire map there is a picture entitled Buxton showing St. Annes Well and the Old Hall as described in Burton's article, Derbyshire Miscellany, Vol.V, Part 2.

Omission, please read with description of Keer's map:

1626 JOHN BILL d. 1630

Map of Derbyshire after Peter Keer (No.27 Darbyshire) in the abridgement of Camden's Britannia with the maps of several shires etc., printed by John Bill. Scale 15 miles -1 1/16 in.

Another Edition 1713, with the title page of engraved plate of the "Theatre" of 1611, but with central panel replaced by: "England Fully Described in a Compleat Sett of Mapps of ye County's of England and Wales....in all 58 mapps. Printed and Sold by Henry Overton at ye White Horse without Newgate, London". "No.18 Derby....Now sold by Henry Overton...." is added above panel bearing Bassett and Chiswell imprint.

Another Edition 1743. As the last....58 Mapps by John Speed.... sold either in compleat setts, bound or single, either coloured or plain, by Henry Overton, at the White-Horse, without Newgate, London, etc." fol. Reprints of Bassett and Chiswell's edition of Speed's Maps 1676. "Derbyshire" plain on the back has the "Hundreds" coloured. "Now sold by Henry Overton" etc. is added above panel bearing imprint of Bassett & Chiswell.

# 1622 MICHAEL DRAYTON 1563-1631

Strange allegorical maps of Great Britain produced for Poly-Olbion, Fart I appeared in 1612. In Part II 1622 a Map of Derbyshire with Leicestershire. Complete set of maps (22), published in 1622 "Polyolbion and Chorographical Description of Great Britain". A reprint was made for the Spencer Society in 1890.

## 1635 MATTHEN SIMONS d.1654

Fublished in 1636 "A Direction for the English Traviller....To be sold by Mathew Simons at the Golden Lion in Ducke laine Ao.1635. Jacob van Langeren sculpt. Scale 10 miles =  $\frac{1}{4}$  in  $5\frac{7}{8} \times 45/6$  in. A "thumb-nail" map of Derbyshire. Miniature map occupying a triangular corner of the plate, the remaining space being taken up with a Table of Distances. The Derbyshire map dated 1635.

Another Edition - Date on Title page is altered to 1636. Map as in 1635 ed.

Another Edition. Imprint altered to: "Are to be sold by Thomas Jenner....1643. Maps re-drawn double size. Scale 10 miles  $(=\frac{1}{2}in.)$ .

Another Edition 1645. Original imprint erased; altered to "Printed and are to ke sold by John Garrett....No date. Van Langeren's name and date 1643 imperfectly erased. Map unaltered impression of that of 1643.

## 1645 JOANNES BLAEU 1596-1673

"DARBIENSIS COMITATUS. VERNACULE DARBIE SHIRE MILLIARIA ANGLICA" (Scale) 8 (= 3 1/8 inches). This map appears in Vol.4 of the monumental work "Atlas Major" (Atlas Novus) published in 11 vols. by J. & G. F. Blaeu in Amsterdam 1648-65). It is a magnificent Atlas of the counties of England compiled mainly from the maps of John Speed but with entirely different decorations. The text is in Latin and consists of 460 pages taken from Candem's Britannia. (Map is numbered 29 in the Atlas.)

Engraved title bears the imprint: "Amsterdami Apud Johannem Blaeu, 1646. The plates with those of the 1st Edition of "Theatrum Orbis Terrarum, Sive Atlas Novus" above.

Milliaria Anglica,  $5 (= 1\frac{7}{8} \text{ inches})$ . Imprint (that of Jansson) is not given.

Another issue 1652. - from the French edition. Title page bears Latin imprint and is dated in tome 1 1656. Part 1 of Vol.4 has 64 uncoloured maps of the British Isles, 48 of which are probably copies of original issue.

Dutch edition 1652. Part 1 of Vol.4 has 64 uncoloured maps of the British Isles, 48 of which appear to be copies of the original issue.

Another edition. Uncoloured maps. Reprint of the Latin edition in 6 Vols. Vol. 1, 2, 3 and 6 are undated. Vol. 4 and 5 dated 1659.

Another edition 1666 having uncoloured maps. Derhyshire map has had several alterations. Latin text on the back of each map - an abridgment from Novus Atlas 1646.

G. Valk and P. Schenk, Amstelaedami, 1683 issue of Janssen's Maps. "It is probable that Peter Schenk, having obtained the business of Jan Janssen, republished his Atlas including the maps of the English Counties. Gerard Valk assisted Peter Schenk in publishing the large Dutch Atlas in 2 vols. folio in 1683". (Chubb)

The plates from Jansson's maps must have been struck off prior to their amendment by ruling across them lines of latitude and longitude for the Valk and Schenk Atlas of 1633. The date given - 1710 - for this issue can only be approximate.

A final issue, of even date with 11th and last edition of the "New Itinerary". It is again unaltered from previous impressions, but re-dated 1828. The plates were subsequently used (much altered) in his "Railroad Companion to England & Wales" London, 12°, by G. F. Cruchley, much disfigured by coarse black lines indicating railways. This edition of "Travellers Companion" issued with 11th edition of New Itinerary 1828.

Map of Derbyshire 1793 by John Cary, in his "New & Correct English Atlas" Second Edition. "London, Printed for John Cary, Engraver & Map Seller, No.181, Near Norfolk Street, Strand. Published as the Act directs Jany 1st 1793". This edition differs from that of 1787 by the omission of the Dedication, the Advertisement and the list of Subscribers. The "Contents" are reset in slightly different type, and a note is added on the verso. There are other slight adjustments and an addition of 12 pages for "Directions for the Junctions of the Roads" re-set, and 2 pages "Index to the Preceding Routes". The imprint of 1787 remains on the map of Derbyshire (also Notts). 47 maps.

Same date.....A second state (or re-issue), with Map of Derbyshire dated 1793.....8 counties are not dated (paper Wmkd. 1808) Fordham.

Same date. A further re-issue. Dedication and advertisement are missing. Slight additions were made to the maps and the letterpress re-set throughout. 1793.

A further edition of the "New & Correct English Atlas". Based on 2nd edition but some maps re-drawn and re-engraved. Maps bear the imprint: "London. Published by J. Cary, Engraver & Map-Seller, No.181, Strand, July 1 1809". They may be identified by the platemark which is  $\frac{1}{2}$  inch beyond the border of the maps instead of  $\frac{1}{4}$ " as was the case with the earlier impressions.

Another edition? London, published May 1810 by J. Cary, Engraver, No.181 Strand.

Another impression. "Published as the Act directs July 1st 1812". The imprints at the foot of the maps all bear the same date....except Rutland which is still dated July 1st 1809.

An edition "Corrected to 1818" being substituted for the date line of 1818 on the title page. None of the maps retain any date except that on Warwickshire "July 1, 1812" has survived from the issue of that year. They all, however, retain Cary's imprint. The text and its arrangement, and the maps are otherwise unaltered except for a resetting of the type of the "Note" on the back of the page of contents. 1821 The maps in this edition are identical in all details with the 1818 edition, with the single exception that the date "July 1, J~12" at the foot of the map of Warwickshire is now removed. Dates on maps corrected to 1821.

Another edition with "Corrected to 1823" on the title page, but maps are unaltered from the impressions of 1821. "Printed for John Cary, Engraver & Map Seller, No.86 St. James's Street", but the maps retain Cary's former address at No.181 Strand.

Another edition corrected "corrected to 1827".

Another edition. At foot of title page is "Corrected to 1831". In other respects it is the same as the 1823 issue.

Derbyshire by John Cary in "Cary's New Map of England and Wales, with part of Scotland.....delineated from actual surveys, and materially assisted from documents supplied.....by the Fostmasters General. The entire map is engraved on eighty-one sheets, in plain ruled borders, arranged for binding in a large quarto volume, and with these borders cut off, for mounting as one complete map. The roads, parks and boundaries of counties are coloured. London: Publish'd June 11th 1794 by J. Cary, Engraver & Map-Seller, No.181 Strand. Scale 5 miles (= 1 inch). Drawn on the Meridian of Greenwich. This appears to be the first map of Derbyshire upon which the meridian of Greenwich is substituted for that of London (St. Paul's) which had been in use on English maps from its introduction by John Seller in 1676. (Greenwich Meridian first used on Thos. Jeffrey's map of Oxfordshire in 1766-7.)

Second Edition. In the title - otherwise unaltered from the original plate of sheet 80 - is now added "Second Edition 1816". Note: This Map has been carefully revised and the whole of the plates re-engraved containing every improvement to the present time. Published Sept. 2nd 1816 by J. Cary, Engraver & Map-Seller, No.181 Strand". (Plate 5 has: Published April 1st 1816.)

Another impression of the second edition. On the title "Second Edition Corrected to 1822" followed by the "Note" as above, and "Published Aug. 3rd 1822 by G. & J. Cary, Engraver & Map-Seller (sic) No.86 St. James's Street". On the margin of plate 5 of this map is the date "April 1st 1816" and "by John Cary", as in the 1816 edition.

Another impression was apparently pu'lished on "May 1st 1824" as this date is retained on the title of the issues of 1828 and 1830.

A further impression, the "Second Edition, Corrected to 1828", but published "May 1st 1824 by G. & J. Cary, Engraver & Map-Seller (sic) No. 86 St. James's Street". Another impression, still described as the "Second Edition" but corrected to 1830. The imprint at the foot of the title is that of 1828. On sheet 5 the date etc. have been erased. Whole surface of the map is re-engraved, in many parts closely following the earlier details, but with additions of hill-shadings generally and in the roads as well as of some towns and villages.

A further issue, the "Second Edition, Corrected to 1832" and "Published May 1st 1832, by G. & J. Cary".

Probably the last impression of this map: "London: Publish'd June 11th 1834 by J. Cary, Engraver and Map-Seller, No.181 Strand". On plate 5 John Cary's name appears with the date June 11th, followed by an erasure. It is difficult to explain this reversion to the plate of 1794, after so many years.

"No.9 Derbyshire". Atlas published 1809. This Atlas was issued in parts from 1801 to 1809, brought together and published as a complete work in the last mentioned year. Imprint on maps reads: London: Published by J. Cary. Engraver & Mapseller, No.181 Strand". Derbyshire map dated 1801.

Another Edition. Title page the same as in first issue with date corrected to 1811. The Maps also have corrected date.

Another Edition. Addition to imprint on title page reads: "Corrected with additions to the year 1818". Maps are again the same as in the first edition. They all have the date 1818 following the title and bear Cary's imprint with the same date.

Another Edition. Title page is dated 1828. Maps of Counties have various dates. "Derbyshire" is dated 1827.

1834 Another Edition. (No details of the Map of Derbyshire in this edition have yet been traced. Presumably it is the same as in the earlier impressions with date altered.)

In "A New Historical and Descriptive View of Derbyshire, from the Remotest Period to the Present Time" By the Rev. D. P. Davies, in 2 vols (often 2 in one). Belper. Printed and Published by and for S. Mason 1811.

#### 1789 E. NOBLE

Map of Derbyshire by E. Noble, in Gough's Translation of Camden's Britannia, London, Printed by John Nichols for T. Payne & Son.... fol.10 x 17 inches. Richard Gough's translation of the 1607 edition of the Britannia, with 60 maps drawn by E. Noble and engraved by J. Cary. "Derbyshire" is Map No.29 in Vol.2 and is inscribed "E. Noble delin. et curavit." Scale of Statute Miles 6 ( $=2\frac{7}{8}$  inches).

# 1794 JOHN STOCKDALE 1739-1814

"Map of Derbyshire" outer borders  $7\frac{3}{4}$ " x  $9\frac{3}{4}$ " with scale 10 miles  $(= 1\frac{5}{8} \text{ inches})$  bearing imprint: "Published November 1 1794 by J. Stockdale, Piccadilly", in the centre below the bottom frame. This map is not mentioned by Chubb and is probably from an earlier Atlas hitherto unrecorded. Chubb states that the maps issued by Stockdale in the "New British Atlas" originally appeared in Conden's "Britannia" translated by Richard Gough in 1789 and re-issued in the 2nd edition of 1806. The scale of the Map of Derbyshire in the "New British Atlas" is 6 miles (= 2 inches), very different from this map of 1794.

"Derbyshire" in "New British Atlas 1805", London, printed for John Stockdale, Picadilly, 1805. fol. $13\frac{1}{4}$  x 20 inches. (John Cary & John Stockdale) These maps were originally issued in Camden's "Britannia" translated by Richard Gough in 1789, and re-issued, as now corrected, in the 2nd edition in 1806. 6 miles (= 2 inches). See E. Noble above.

Another bears the imprint: "London. Printed for John Stockdale, Picadilly; by J. Nichols & Son, Red Lion Passage, Fleet Street, 1806". These maps are the same as the first issue with "Published by John Stockdale, Piccadilly, 26 March 1806" added to the title of each one.

# 1794 THOMAS BROWN fl. 1800 Publisher

Two maps of Derbyshire were issued in "General View of the Agriculture in the County of Derby" by Thomas Brown; London: Printed by W. Bulmer & Co. 1794. The first map is coloured to illustrate "The Soil of Derbyshire", and the second, uncoloured, shows the rivers of the county. Neither map bears the name of the engraver. They are drawn to the scale of 10 miles (=  $1\frac{1}{2}$  inches). The most important places are marked on both maps.

### 1798 JOHN TUKE fl. 1787

1798. A Map of ninety miles by seventy five in which Chesterfield is the centre, by J. Tuke. This is not a map of Derbyshire exclusively but the County is the central piece. The map is of sufficient importance to be included.

### 1801 CHARLES SMITH f1.1800-52

2nd Edition. Date on the maps corrected to Jan.6 1804 and "2nd Edition" corrected "1808". This is apparently the 2nd edition of the Atlas but the 3rd issue of the Maps.

3rd Edition. The maps are still dated "1804" but with the addition of "3rd edition Corrected to 1818".

No.9 Derbyshire. Scale of miles  $10 (= 2\frac{1}{4} \text{ ins})$ . Gardner sculpt. in "Smith's New English Atlas, being a reduction of his large folio Atlas, Containing a Complete Set of County Maps on which are Delineated All the Direct and principal Cross Roads, Cities, Towns and Most considerable Villages, Parks, Rivers....The whole carefully Arranged According to the Stations & Intersections of the Trigonl. Similar in construction to those in Cary's "New & Correct English Atlas of 1787. The roads are the principal feature.

Another Edition. The imprint is altered to "Printed for C. Smith, Mapseller extraordinary to His Majesty. No.172 Strand 1834", and the name of the engraving firm given "Jones & Smith" or its variations, is omitted from the maps. No.9 Derbyshire corrected to "1834".

Another Edition. Possibly there was an edition issued at this time as these are separate county maps with: Corrected to "1846".

Another Edition. Sir H. G. Fordham's collection contains sections for Hereford, Somerset and Warwicks. Printed on paper watermarked "1822", and he thinks it probable that another edition of the above work was published in that year.

Another edition, consisting of 41 maps of counties of England, with general map of England, N. Wales & S. Wales finely engraved on steel by Gray & Son, J. Neele & Co. and R. Scott. Many maps have neatly engraved vignettes in the corner of the plate. The County Maps were re-issued in "The Parliamentary G-zetteer of England and Wales 1843 - View of St. Mary's Bridge and Chapel, Derby. Map No.10. 10 miles (=  $1\frac{5}{8}$  inches). 1836.

Map of Derbyshire 1843 in "The Parliamentary Gazetteer.... illustrated by a series of Maps forming a complete county-atlas of England....London, Edinburgh & Glasgow. A. Fullarton & Co. 1843 8vo. 4 vols. 6<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> x 10 inches. County maps are the same as those issued in "A New and Comprehensive Gazetteer of England....by James Bell 1833-4. They now have railways added.

Another Edition 1845. Map of Derbyshire in this edition is 7  $3/8 \ge 9 3/8$  inches measured by outside borders. The title reads "The Parliamentary Gazetteer of England and Wales, Adapted to the Poor Law, Franchise, Municipal and Ecclesiastical Arrangements, and Compiled with a Special Reference to the Railroad and Canal Communications as Existing in 1840-44. Illustrated by a Series of Maps....With an Appendix containing the results in detail of the Census of 1841, London, Edinburgh and Dublin: A Fulkarton & Co. 13 vols. 1845. Scale 10 miles (= 1 9/16").

Another Edition. Mentioned by Sir H. G. Fordham in "Maps of Herts". The imprint is given as in 1845, i.e. "London, Edin'urg and Dublin". The number of volumes is not given by Chubb. The maps are the same as in the last edition. 10 miles (=  $1 \frac{9}{16}$  inches).

#### 1833 JAMES DUNCAN

No.9 Derbyshire 1833 in "A Complete County Atlas of England and Wales containing forty-four superior maps. With all the improvements projected or completed. Divided into Hundreds. With the District Divisions and other Local Arrangements effected by the Reform Bill. London: Published by James Duncan, Paternoster Row (1833) fol. 9" x 15". The titles begin "New Map of", and end: "Local Arrangements effected by the Reform Bill". 10 miles (=  $2\frac{3}{4}$  inches). Another edition 1840. Sir H. G. Fordham, in his "Hertfordshire Maps" 1907 mentions a copy of this Atlas, with the title slightly altered, following forty-four superior maps, it now reads: "With all the railroads and Improvements, projected or completed", etc. It is not dated, but on the cover of the copy in his possession is stamped: "Rail Road County Atlas 44 Maps 1840". Same scale.

Another edition 1845. Copy of this edition in Cambridge University Library bears no date on title page and as the maps show the state of the railways about the year 1845 the maps could not have been issued before that date. The county maps show the hundreds in colcur.

# 1834 CHRISTOPER 1786-1855 & JOHN fl.1821-40 GREENWOOD (see also J. and C. Walker p. 42)

Map of Derbyshire, No.18 in Part II of "Atlas of the Counties of England, from Actual Surveys made from the years 1817 to 1833 by C. & J. Greenwood, Published by the Proprietors Greenwood & Co., Burleigh Street, Strand, London. Published April 1st 1834. Engraved by J. & C. Walker fol.  $31 \times 25\frac{3}{4}$  inches. Beautifully produced coloured maps of counties reduced from the large maps of scale 1 inch to the mile. Various engravers. Derbyshire was engraved by J. & C. Walker showing a view of Chatsworth. "Corrected to....,Feb. 24th 1830. Derbyshire map dated 1830. 10 miles (= 3 1/8 inches).

Another impression 1834 corrected (except Hunts) to Jan. 26th 1831. The maps are uncoloured but otherwise unaltered. 10 miles (=  $3 \frac{1}{8}$  inches.)

#### 1834 MARY M. RODWELL

Map of Derbyshire in "The Geography of the British Isles....by Mary Martha Rodwell....London: Printed for Longman, Rees, Orme, Brown, Green & Longman, Paternoster Row, 1834. 8vo. 4 1/8" x 7". Maps engraved on 59 plates  $3\frac{1}{2}$  x 6 inches with two maps on each. These bear no inscription beyond the name of the county. Towns are indicated by numbers and rivers by letters. As a county map it is of little value although somewhat of a curiosity.

# 1835 THOMAS DUCDALY fl 1835-1860 L. TALLIS fl. 1850.

Map of Derbyshire 1835 - No.10 in "Curiosities of Great Britain. England and Wales Delineated. Historical, Entertaining and Commercial. Alphabetically arranged. By Thomas Dugdale, Antiquarian, assisted by William Burnett, Civil Engineer. Vol.1. Tallis & Co., Green Arbour Court, Old Bailey, 1835. Vol.2. John Tallis, 15 St. John's Lane, Smithfield. Vol 3. L. Tallis, 3 Jewin Street, City. 8vo.  $5 \ 1/8 \ x \ 7^{\frac{1}{7}}$  inches. The Map of Derbyshire, which follows p. 606 in Vol.2 can be distinguished from those in editions of 1843 and 1848 by the County Title which is placed in the centre at the top of the map, and by the absence of railways. At the foot of the map, in the centre, is the imprint "+ Polling Booths" which is omitted in later issues. The name of the engraver is not given. The Hundreds are outlined in colour. Scale 5 miles (=  $\frac{3}{4}$  inch). Another edition 1843 - in 4 volumes. The Map of Derbyshire now shows railways, the Hundreds are marked but uncoloured, the title appears in the right hand corner at the top of the map with the Scale underneath. The imprint "Engraved for Dugdale's England and Wales Lelineated" is shown in the centre, outside the frame, at the foot, and on the right "Drawn and Engraved by J. Archer, Pentonville London. The scale shows 10 miles instead of 5 given in the 1835 edition. Another peculiar feature is the reversal of numbers showing degrees and minutes W. of Greenwich. They read "2°W of Greenwich....10.... 20....30....40....50" from left to right, or W. to E! 10 miles  $(= 1\frac{1}{2} \text{ inches})$ 

Another edition - arrangement similar to that of 1835... Maps are in alphabetical order, Derbyshire is No.16 in this edition. Longitude figures have been reversed and so corrected. Coloured border and Hundreds in coloured outline as in 1st edition but with railways added and Polling Booths omitted. Imprints in 1843 issue have been erase? and the name of engraver etc. "Drawn & Engraved by J. Archer, Pentonville, London" is given in the bottom right hand corner. Same scale. A further edition 1854-60 was issued with some maps but with additions to railways.

# 1836 THOMAS MOULE 1784-1851

Map of Derbyshire 1836 in "The English Counties Delineated; or A Topographical Description of England. Illustrated by a map of London and a completeseries of county maps. By Thomas Moule....London: George Vertue, 26 Ivy Lane, Paternoster Row, 1836. 4to.  $8\frac{1}{2} \times 10\frac{7}{5}$  ins. This issue has engraved sub-title dated 1836: "England's Topographer or Moule's English Counties in the 19th century. 5 miles (= 1 inch).

Another Edition 1837. Title as above. "No.40 Derbyshire, engraved by J. Bingley, with views of All Saints, Derby; Chatsworth; Matlock and Entrance to Peak Cavern. A finely produced set of 58 maps with decorated borders and symbolic pictures. Same scale.

Another edition, 1838. (The plates engraved for Moule's "English Counties Delineated" were taken over c.1840 for use in "Barclay's Universal English Dictionary". Further editions of this work were issued in 1842, 1848, 1850 and 1852. They are steel engravings finely executed. There are a number of these Maps on the market which have been coloured and framed. Same scale. Maps issued without Hundreds being outlined; uncoloured in original state.

# 1842 J. ARCHER fl.1841-61

Map of Derbyshire by J. Archer published in Fisher's County Atlas of England and Wales. The Map is No.7 and the work was apparently begun by James Gilbert of Paternoster Row whose name and imprint appear on the first seven county maps. The Atlas was issued in parts from 1842-45. 4to.  $12 \times 14\frac{1}{2}$  inches. The Derbyshire Map has: "Scale of Fnglish miles 6 (= 2 inches). Gilbert's County Atlas.... Engraved by J. Archer....Published June 1 1842, for the proprietor, M. Alleis, by James Gilbert etc.".

## 1842 JAMES WYLD elder 1790-1836 JAMES WYLD younger 1812-87

Wyld's "Atlas of English Counties" is recorded in "The London Catalogue of Books published in Great Britain from 1814-1846" and eight maps bearing the imprint: "London. Fublished by Jas. Wyld, Charing Cross East", are in the British Museum. They bear a strong resemblance to those in Cary's "New & Correct English Atlas, according to Chubb. (I have been unable to trace a map of Derbyshire from this work, but it no doubt exists although it is not among the 8 in the B.M.

# 1853 AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY OF ENGLAND. JOHN MURRAY 1745-1843 Fublishers

"No.25 Map of Derbyshire - a geological map - dated 1853" in "The Journal of the Royal Agricultural Society of England", J. Murray: London 1843-70. 8vo. 10 miles (=  $1\frac{5}{6}$  inches). During the abovyears the Agricultural Society published monographs on the agriculture of the English counties accompanied by geological maps of a somewhat sketchy nature on a small scale.

#### 1845 REUBEN RAMBLE

Map of Derbyshire 1845 in "Reuben Ramble's Travels through the Counties of England. With Maps and Historical Vignettes. Darton & Clark, 58 Holborn Hill, Print and Map publishers (1845) 4to. 6 x 7 1/8 ins. A work of indifferent quality containing 40 lithographed maps which are reproductions from those issued in "Miller's New Miniature Atlas in 1810. The original imprints have been erased. 10 miles (=  $\frac{1}{2}$  inch).

#### 1847 THOMAS JOHNSON

No.8 Map of Derbyshire 1847 in "Johnson's Atlas of England: with all the Railways containing forty two Separate Maps of the Counties and Islands. Manchester, published by Thos. Johnson. 1847. Lizars sc. 4to.  $8 1/8 \ge 10^{\frac{1}{2}}$  inches." Contains title page printed in blue, a list of "Contents" and forty-one coarsely drawn litho. maps of the counties of England. The map of Derbyshire bears the Arms of the Duke of Devonshire. 5 miles (= 1 inch).

## 1848 JAMES REYNOLDS fl 1848-60

No.9 Map of Derbyshire 1848 in "Reynolds's Travelling Atlas of England: with all Railways and Stations accurately laid down. Constructed from the Surveys of the Board of Ordnance, Railway Companies

and other authorities. London: Simpkin, Marshall & Co. Stationer's Court: and James Reynolds, 174 Strand, 1848. 8vo.  $5 \ge 7$  inches. 10 miles (=  $l_{2}^{1}$  inches). A rather badly prepared Atlas, the redeeming feature being the clear engraving of the thirty two maps it contains. The imprint and engraver's name are given in the bottom left hand corner and the number of the Map in the bottom right. In some cases there are three or even four counties given on one plate, but Derbyshire had one on its own. The map is geographically coloured and was re-issued in Reynolds' "Geological Atlas of Great Britain" in 1860 and later. Another reproduction took place in 1864 in the "Portable Atlas of England and Wales" 8vo.  $5 \ge 7\frac{4}{7}$  inches. In the latter Atlas the outside border lines on the maps have been removed together with the imprints and numbers. The numbers have been re-engraved within the single border lines.

# 1850 HENRY GEORGE COLLINS

No.ll Map of Derbyshire 1850 in "The Travelling Atlas of England and Wales, with all the Railways and Coach Roads, the Cities, Towns, Parks and Gentlemen's Seats Preceded by General Map of England and North and South Wales. The whole carefully Revised and Corrected to the Present Time - which probably means there was an earlier edition -Published (for the proprietors) by Henry George Collins, 22 Paternoster Row (1850) 8vo.  $5 \ge 6\frac{1}{2}$  inches. 10 miles (= 1 inch). A neatly prepared Atlas....forty two clearly drawn lithographed maps of English Counties etc....Each map bears the imprint: "London: Published for the Proprietors by H. G. Collins, 22 Paternoster Row".

Another Edition - the imprint now reads ".....By W. S. Orme & Co., 2 Amen Corner, Paternoster Row". 1862.

Another Edition - Printed and published by John Heywood, 141-143 Deansgate, Manchester. 1863.

## APPENDIX

## LARGE SCALE MAPS

 PETER PEREZ BURDETT, a friend of Joseph Wright, made a large scale map of Derbyshire "from an actual survey" and this was published in 1767. Engraved by Kitchen.

1791. A large map with improvements by George Snowden of Derby, the proprietor of the plates. This map is the same size as the original. A copy belonging to the Derbyshire Archaeological Society has been deposited on loan with the County Record Office at Matlock.

- <u>CHRISTOPHER GREENWOOD</u> produced a large scale (1 inch) map of Derbyshire in 1826. There is a copy of this map in the County Record Office.
- 3. <u>G. SANDERSON</u> produced a large scale (1 inch) map of Derbyshire in 1836. A copy of this map was presented to the Derbyshire Archaeological Society by Mr. Frank Smith of Pinxton, and this has been deposited on loan with the County Record Office.

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
